Now as a 501c3 the Arts Collaborative is an inclusive group of artists and arts supporters committed to sustaining and growing all forms of the arts in Santa Barbara. SBAC welcomes all to participate in the focused support of individual artists. The Arts Collaborative serves as a catalyst to foster collaborative and innovative ways for the community to engage in the arts.

JANUARY OF 2018 Santa Barbara Arts Collaborative began its third year of operating the Community Arts Workshop (CAW). During the year we successfully completed Phase II of construction, increased rentals, community programs, and activities at the space, and collaborated with more than 16 different organizations and arts groups. Our Management Committee continues to oversee improvements and uses of the CAW and a Community Outreach Committee has been developed to increase and expand community engagement and opportunities. Following is a summary of the various activities and uses of the Community Arts Workshop.

The year began with an **Art Talk** with the Shelton group of artists, and a discussion about their unique

collaborative approach and innovative architectural style.

In February we hosted Santa Barbara's first **Puppetpalooza Festival** for a teaching workshop conducted by Andrew Kim of the highly-regarded Thingumajig Theatre, and for puppet performances.

Increased Opportunities for Local Artists and Community Engagement

A Pilot Artist Residency program

at the CAW began in February through a collaboration with the Santa Barbara Foundation who provided funding support for the program. "The Arts Residency program demonstrates how the arts can elevate important social issues and build bridges for constructive conversation," said Sharyn Main, former Senior Director of Community Investment at the Santa Barbara Foundation. "It is our hope that the CAW will be recognized not just as a place for artists to work,

but as a critical public space of civic engagement and conversation."

When the CAW renovations are complete, we will be able to fund further iterations of this exciting program.

The first residency program, Going Home Project, was led by Michael Morgan, and a team of artists taught theatre skills to youth from Noah's Anchorage Youth Crisis Shelter, through a partnership with Noah's Anchorage, a program of the YMCA. Youth involved were currently homeless or recently had been, and artists helped them create a play based on the youths' own experiences. They were individually mentored by theatre artists, poets, and photographers, and they shared their stories in performance with politicians, leaders of social service organizations, philanthropists, and their family and friends. The project concluded with a live performance for the public in the north building of the CAW.

In March the second residency project began, Print Power. A team of local printmakers (Bay Hallowell, Sara Woodburn, Meagan Stirling, and project lead Claudia Borfiga) conducted a series of printmaking workshops with sexual assault survivors and loved ones in partnership with the Santa Barbara Rape Crisis Center. The participants reported, "I had never done anything like that before. It gave me a chance to express something that has been buried deep down inside for a very long time." The prints were shown in an exhibition remarkable for the diversity of experiences shown and the power of the art created. Many of the workshop participants had never shared their stories or opened up about them, and the project lead to

significant conversations and visibility for a hidden issue.

In September rehearsals began for Cuentos del Pueblo, the final project of our Artist in Residence program. A community-based storytelling theater project lead by Joseph Velasco, with Carlos Cuellar and Sio Tepper, Cuentos del Pueblo (or "Stories of the Town") drew upon Velasco's work with El Teatro Campesino and City at Peace Santa Barbara; Cuellar's decades of work as a muralist, photographer, and teaching artist, and Tepper's experience as a musician and co-founder of TOTEM. Cuentos del Pueblo sought to "create a safe space for members of the community to come together and develop their own stories through a series of acting and storytelling workshops." The workshops culminated in public performances in the South Building in December based on the participants' lives and experiences. The performances included audience dialogue about the issues brought up in the work.

Construction Update: Completion of Phase II

The Arts Collaborative successfully raised \$45,000 toward the completion of the David Shelton Ortega Street Gate in January as a result of former mayor Helene Schneider generously hosting a going-

away party/fundraising event for the Community Arts Workshop. The event featured local music, art, and conversation.

In August we began construction on Phase II of the renovation plans at the Community Arts Workshop. This phase brought **new bathrooms**, a **completed Garden Street entryway**, and **2 new supervisory rooms** to the CAW, greatly expanding the space's functionality. The bathrooms included public art mosaics created by youth in the **Police Activities**

League (PAL) led by Tami Macala and community volunteers. Almost as soon as renovations were complete the Arts Collaborative began to get new kinds of requests for the use of the space. Construction completed at the end of October.

Services and Opportunities for Youth

In April the **Visual Arts and Design Academy (VADA)** from Santa Barbara
High School returned for the third
time to the CAW for their end-of-year
student exhibition. This year as always
they filled the space with art, youth,
and families. It's one of our favorite
events of the year.

Providing a Home for Summer Solstice Celebration

On May 1 Summer Solstice Celebration began its load-in and work at the CAW, which continued until their load-out July 20th. As always they packed the space with puppets, glitter, lumber, tools, music, and activity for this annual tradition which involves hundreds of local artists and is enjoyed by thousands of observers on State Street.

Providing Space for Local Artists to Collaborate, Innovate, and Engage the Community

In July, On the Verge Theatre Festival (OTV) spent their third year at the Community Arts Workshop. This young festival is already starting to become an annual tradition, bringing exciting new plays dealing with contemporary issues to Santa Barbara each year. All rehearsals and performances are conducted at the Community Arts Workshop. OTV has told us they would not be able to keep doing the festival without the CAW facilities.

Lit Moon Theatre Company also conducted a special performance of Richard III at the CAW in July. John Blondell, Lit Moon Artistic Director, said about the CAW: "As a downtown, urban site, it is accessible, local, and deeply tied to Santa Barbara past and present. The atmosphere of the CAW is simple, rough, poetic, and mythic — it is full of character and age, unlike any other space in Santa Barbara. We can't wait to go back."

Late in September an annual CAW tradition, Pianos on State, took up residence once again. Conducted in partnership with numerous local

organizations including the Santa Barbara Bowl Foundation, Office of Arts & Culture and City of Santa Barbara, the pianos are painted annually at the CAW by local artists, and then placed on State Street for several weeks for the public to play and enjoy.

In early October we hosted the American Institute of Architects, Santa Barbara, for their annual ArchitecTours celebration. mid-October we partnered with the Housing Authority, Santa Barbara Beautiful, and the Office of Arts and Culture for a film showing of Miracle on 42nd Street, a documentary about a housing project for artists in New York and the impact it made there, followed by a panel discussion about affordable housing for artists in Santa Barbara. In late October, Creative Democracy used the CAW for their event "The Art of Community." which brought together local visual artists and performers for an event celebrating Santa Barbara's community of artists.

In November we hosted the Cerveza Festival, a fundraiser for a project to create a Latin American Art Museum in Santa Barbara. The

In November and December, the Museum of Contemporary Art, SB rented the CAW for two art talks. In early December **Downtown Santa** Barbara, Inc. rented the CAW for the third time to build floats for its annual holiday parade on State Street. We also for the first time hosted an Arts and Crafts Fair at the CAW, organized by Vanae Rivera. The event brought together over 15 local art and craftmakers to sell their work before the holidays. "We think this may be the making of an annual tradition."

And we closed the year with the final performance of Cuentos del Pueblo for an audience of just under 200. According to project participants, "What was beautiful about this project is it brought a group of strangers together, and it built a closeness and a connectedness. It broke down barriers and established hope in each of us for a stronger community in this city."




By Ethnicity




